Notes from the Vice President

Greetings United Methodist Women Sisters in Christ:

How grateful we are that the Lord has blessed us to see a new year – one filled with endless opportunities to make a difference in the lives of women, children and youth.

Certainly, our communities have been ripped with unprecedented pandemics. Each of these crises mandates that we find creative ways to take care of ourselves and each other and to advocate for justice and equality. Thank God for United Methodist Women!

Local UMW units continue to become knowledgeable about social issues by engaging in activities and events that knit us together as we prepare ourselves for God's good work.

As your Vice President, I have been involved with the following activities:

Columbia District United Methodist Women Virtual Local Unit Officers Training

With the help of the district team, I planned the Virtual Officers Training held January 16th at which I presided. The host church was Grace UMC. The event addressed the theme, Readiness to Serve.

The program consisted of two parts. Part 1 was a plenary, a spiritual opening with greetings, devotion and special music that set the stage for equipping women to serve as leaders. Part 2 was Leadership Development Breakout Sessions facilitated by members of the Columbia District Leadership Team and special guest, Eunice White, Conference E&I Coordinator. There were local unit officers in each of the twelve workshops with a total of 103 participants. Thirty eight (38) of the participants filled out the evaluation form. 87% of the responses were very favorable (4's and 5's); 13% were less favorable (3's and 2's) with a few suggestions for improvement.

Church Women United (CWU)

I attended the following CWU events:

- (1) Executive Board Meeting January 8, 2021;
- (2) Annual Meeting January 22 at which time I was installed as the United Methodist Denominational Coordinator. The guest speaker was Elizabeth Van Harn, Associate Organizer for M.O.R.E. Justice;
- (3) CWU Annual Bible Study, February 5th with facilitator Rev. Angela Ford-Nelson who focused on the theme: Build on a Strong Foundation;
- (4) February 5th Executive Board Meeting that followed the Bible Study.

South Carolina Conference United Methodist Women Legislative Advocacy Day

Women across South Carolina would gather by Zoom on four days during the month of February to explore issues of advocacy and justice. At the time of this writing, I had attended the first Zoom workshop **Wednesday, Feb 3**, from 10-11:30 a.m. on Juvenile Justice Reform conducted by Dr. Aleksandra Chauhan, Juvenile Defender Advocate for the South Carolina Commission on Indigent Defense. She gave an update on the status of reform and proposed legislation in South Carolina. Other workshops were held **Feb. 9th, 18th and 27th**. I hope many of you had an opportunity to zoom in. Please share info with members of your local unit.



A Call to Prayer and Self-Denial

During the first few months of each year, preferably, January, February or March, United Methodist Women are encouraged to commemorate A Call to Prayer and Self-Denial through learning, prayer and giving. Absentee members were Becky Travis, Evelyn Neal, and Mary Anne Dewitt.

Bridgette Gruber led the devotion and prayer. Each member was asked to introduce themselves.

Secretary Carrie Murray reported that the minutes were printed in the October 20, 2020 Gleanings which were received and adopted as information.

New Business/Announcements

- All attendees voted to purchase a Zoom account and the Local Unit will be able to use this account as well. Funds from the Columbia District United Methodist Women treasure will be used to purchase this account.
- Carrie Murray made a motion to combine MNO/E&I for officers training and was second by Sandra Love. The motion was carried and so ordered.
- Church Women United World Day of Prayer is scheduled for March 5, at Jones Memorial AME Zion, 2400 Barhamville Rd., Columbia, SC 29204 or via Zoom.
- The Church Women United Spring Luncheon is scheduled for April 10, at Brookland Baptist Banquet Center, 1066 Sunset Blvd, West Columbia, SC 29169-(May be cancelled due to COVID-19).

Reports were given from the following officers:

• **President** Debra Schooler - reported that she had been working on the Officer Training meeting and did not have any more to report. She did welcome everyone and is encouraged by what a wonderful team we have in the Columbia District.

• Vice President - Carrie Murray reported that she attended CWU Executive Board Meeting January 8, 2021. She will be installed at the Annual Meeting January 22 as the United Methodist Denominational Coordinator.

With the help of the district team, she planned the Virtual Officers Training Event held January 16th at which she presided. The host church was Grace UMC. The event addressed the theme, *Readiness to Serve*. She thanked the Columbia District UMW Team for serving as workshop facilitators during the training.

- Treasurer Tiffany Phillips reported the Check book balance as of 12/09/2020 was \$5,506.33, received from churches (12/10/2020-1/15/2021) \$9,365.82, total in account \$14,872.15.
- **Communication Coordinator** Sharee Washington Articles and Reports for the March *Gleanings* will be due Feb. 10, 2021.

We will remove officers' phone and mailing address from the *Gleanings*. We will only include name, role, church, and email address.

Within the next 2 quarters, we will transition to a newsletter format of the *Gleanings* using MailChimp. This will allow the *Gleanings* to be sent automatically to everyone's email address. By Allowing people to opt-in and opt-out will allow us to have a current email list. We will also update the mailing list to include all District Officers, Local Unit Officers (Pres, V. President, Treasurer, Secretary/Communications), and paid membership (\$4/year per person).

Communications was approved to create a District Zoom Account that will allow for 3 licenses (Rhonda Washington, Sharee Washington, Debra Schooler) to host meetings. Any local UMW unit and/or Circle can use the accounts.

- **Spiritual Growth** Bridgette Gruber stated they had a quiet year. The Annual Retreat is scheduled for April 24, 2021 via Zoom; Day Apart is scheduled for March 6, 2021 via Zoom; and she is asking everyone to wear a hat of their choice.
- Social Action Patricia Armstrong Legislative Advocacy Day will be a virtual event taking place over 4 days at various times. Registration information is in the last Advocate and on the Conference website. National body of UMW adopted two priority mission focus areas, Climate Justice and Mass Incarceration/Interrupting the School-to Prison Pipeline

- The Columbia District was asked to select a mission focus. The leadership team voted to adopt Mass Incarceration/Interrupting the School to Prison Pipeline.
- **MNO** Debra Schooler reported in Mary Anne's absence that Mary Anne would be getting in touch with everyone about the census due by March 31.
- Education and Interpretation Rhonda Washington Logistical information as to where to send stamps and tabs will be included in the March 2021 issue of Gleanings.

Units have been asked to promote the Mission Emphasis months during their local meetings.

Units have been encouraged to complete at least 10 out of 15 items on the Mission Today Form. As E&I Coordinator, I will email "The Mission Today Form" to the E&I training attendees. The form will also be included in the March 2021 issue of *Gleanings*.

- Chair of Nominations Linda Kennedy asked that members from the Local Units fill out the Local Unit Officers information form and send to the Secretary.

- Cluster Reports were received from the following Leaders: Cluster 4: Faye Love; Cluster 5: Tiffany Phillips; Cluster 6: Sandra Love.

Closing prayer was given by Sandra Love. Meeting was adjourned at 1:30PM.

To successfully interrupt the school-to-prison pipeline, we must resist efforts to criminalize children of color and move towards comprehensive, community-rooted solutions that offer genuine safety for all children.

We encouraged UMW units to take advantage of the different digital media such as ZOOM to join with other UMW units to educate ourselves on the issue, take steps to increase awareness of the issue and work together to address this mission priority. 
Program Resources Report



During the midst of a global pandemic, Columbia Bethlehem Community Center remained true to its mission to meet educational, cultural, recreational and spiritual needs of children and families in the Midlands while encouraging them to use their individual gifts to make a positive difference in their lives and in their communities.



We adapted to the needs of those in the communities we serve and created programs that would benefit them throughout this unique and difficult time.

In the spring of 2020, we implemented the Community Feeding Program. On June 15, 2020, we opened our doors up to offer FREE lunch and breakfast for students under 18 and their parents - meaning that anyone in need of a meal was welcome to CBCC. We prepared an average of at least 60 meals per day. During the months of June, July and August we served at least 6,500 meals, these included breakfast and lunch for seven days a week to over 50 families.

This initiative is powered through Francis Burns UMC. Annually we host this program, this year we are using a grab and go method in addition to offering our participants food for the weekend as well. This was an option for families in the area throughout the summer and fall months.

In partnership with Junior League of Columbia and Delivering Goods, we hosted a clothing drive to benefit working women, teachers, students and families in Columbia. New clothing items were available at no cost to men, women and children of all sizes. Community members were welcomed to come shop at our invite-only boutique style set up.

With adjustments, we will continue to offer some signature programs to the community, such as "Ready, Set, Read", Bible Study, and holiday community gatherings.

The Bethlehem Center – Spartanburg February 2021

Greetings and virtual hugs from the Bethlehem Center-Spartanburg. In November, we participated virtually in the Sertoma Club's Annual "Auction for a Cause" fundraiser for non-profits. We had 88 entries and all were bid on. While we did not receive money from ticket sales or a percentage of the beverage bar, we were still able to raise just under \$9,500.

Our After-School Christmas celebration was conducted as a "drive-through" event with the gift bags prepared by board members handed out to the children through their car windows. The Highland Community sponsored a Christmas bike give-away at the Center and were able to gift 148 bikes, scooters and Big Wheels, to children in the community.

Our Board of Directors have been meeting virtually and will continue to do so thru March. At that time we will re-evaluate the status of the virus and make plans accordingly. Due to the loss of several board members, we are currently seeking new board members who can bring a fresh perspective, new energy or have business/community contacts who can help us meet our needs. Current Board members were asked to set a personal goal for 2021 and submit it to Sue Owens, our Board Chair.

Ms. Cecelia McAlister has been hired as the Director for the Highland Early Learning Center. While we are awaiting approval of the renovation plans for the building, which is across the street from the Center, Ms. McAlister has been busy compiling all of the many manuals, handbooks, schedules, job descriptions, and handouts that will be needed when the Center opens up this summer.

Our S.O.A.R. After-school and Virtual Voyagers programs have resumed for the second half of the 2020-2021 school year and our seniors have been able to return to the center for their "Sewing to Sow" program but are being limited to six (6) attendees as a safety precaution.

Since the onset of the Covid-19 pandemic March 2020 thru January 2021, the Center has been able to assist 725 individuals with \$37,270.90 worth of food, toiletries, paper products, diapers and more. Through the Cares Act Funding, which was awarded by the City of Spartanburg, the Center has been able to assist 25 residents with over \$6,465.00 for rental assistance. These individuals were directly impacted by Covid and were at risk of becoming homeless. Most suffered from job losses or a vast reduction in hours due to the pandemic.

On behalf of the Center, I would like to thank each of you for your continued support and prayers. I am also looking forward to the time when we can once again come together in body and spirit and NOT by looking into the camera eye of our electronic devices.




