FROM THE SPIRITUAL GROWTH COORDINATOR

Greetings Sisters In Christ,

God has blessed us as United Methodist Women to witness another days' journey, especially throughout this pandemic experience. We are still here, as women of God, holding on to our Trust and Faith in God. With God's Grace and Mercy, we will continue to fulfill our responsibilities and duties as we provide opportunities and resources to grow spiritually.

As we approach this Lenten Season, I am reminded of Jesus dying on the cross and shedding His blood for us. I am also mindful of words like forgiveness and redemption. I would like to share this story with you that was passed on to me. It's entitled, "The Blood Washes?"

One night in a church service, a young woman felt the tug of the Holy Spirit in her heart. She responded to God's call and accepted Jesus as her Lord and Savior. The young woman had a very rough past, involving alcohol, drugs, and prostitution. But, the change in her was evident. As time went on, she became a faithful member of the church. She eventually became involved in the ministry, teaching young children.

It was not very long until this faithful young woman had caught the eye and the heart of the pastor's son. The relationship grew and they began to make wedding plans. This is when the problems began. You see, about one half of the church did not think that a woman with a past, such as hers, was suitable for a pastor's son. The church began to argue and fight about the matter. So they decided to have a meeting.

As the people made their arguments and tensions increased, the meeting got completely out of hand. The young woman became very upset about all the things being brought up about her past. As she began to cry, the pastor's son stood to speak. He could not bear the pain, it was causing his wife-to-be. He began to speak and his statement was this: "My fiancé's past is not what is on trial here. What you are questioning is the ability of the blood of Jesus. So, does it wash away sin or not?"

Too often, even as Christians, we bring up the past and use it as a weapon against our brothers and sisters. Forgiveness is a very foundational part of the Gospel of the Lord Jesus Christ. If the blood of Jesus does not cleanse the other person completely, then it cannot cleanse us completely. If that is the case, then we are all in a lot of trouble. What can wash away my sins? Nothing but the blood of Jesus…end of case! We have God's blessings. Now, take those blessings and bless someone else! Go in Peace.

The South Carolina Conference United Methodist Women Legislative Advocacy Day Zoom Virtual Program spanned four weeks in February. Although the Pandemic has curtailed our personal interaction, we still meet via zoom for a full array of topic Workshops to educate and encourage our United Methodist Ladies to action! We had an awesome time and we learned from the topics discussed by the workshop presenters. If you missed it, visit our SCCUMW Facebook page to view Legislative Advocacy Days workshop presentations.

The Global UMW will focus upon two Social Justice Priorities for the next Quadrennial – Mass Incarceration/ Criminalization of Communities of Color, with a particular focus on the Interrupting the School-to Prison Pipeline Campaign and Climate Justice, with a particular focus on the Just Energy for All Campaign. Both National campaigns addresses are on the www.unitedmethodistwomen.org website.

Our SCCUMW District Social Action Coordinators have also chosen to focus upon very important South Carolina issues including Mass Incarceration/Criminal Justice Reform, Quality Education for all our Children, Expanded and Improved Mental and Physical Health Services Access, and Environmental Justice for 2021. Districts and Units are certainly free to focus upon any issues that are of local concern and we encourage all UMW to share their activities and results. On a statewide level, the SC Social Action Committee will continue to track and highlight State legislative action concerning our primary focus areas and share resource information through periodic bulletins.

WORKING ON THE FRONTLINE Part 1

A Nurse's Perspective By Chan Spigner

Evelyn Pauling, Orangeburg District United Methodist Women President from 2008-2012, is a Registered Nurse, who works in the Intensive Care Unit (ICU), with patients who have COVID 19 at The Regional Medical Center. She has been an RN for 34 years. Evelyn states that she became a nurse to help and care for people. Did she ever consider leaving her job as a nurse, during this National Pandemic of COVID 19? "No, I could never consider walking away. I became a nurse because it is my calling to help others, and sometimes your calling comes with making sacrifices," Evelyn states. Evelyn recalls when she and her colleagues were tasked with opening the COVID unit for the hospital. They prepped and planned for days for the unknown, as they listened to the news reports of the number of deaths and patients on ventilators across the country. "No prepping or planning could have prepared anyone, for the emotional roller coaster ride, filled with stress, anxiety, and despair, which they were about to face," Evelyn states.

Evelyn recalls the first COVID 19 patient arrival at the hospital. "While it was a time of uncertainty, we remained hopeful. On that day, as we huddled prior to returning home to our families, we were filled with tears, as we prayed and asked God to protect our health and strength. It has been quite a journey over the past year. We are still providing the best quality of care for patients who have COVID 19. As nurses, we ensure that we are providing holistic care for patients with COVID 19. By doing this, we are giving focus to all patient-care needs. This includes physical, social, and psychological care, because they are separated from their families and placed in isolation away from the touch of a loved one. The clinical team are often the only visitors of these patients. Because visitation has been discontinued for a period of time, to keep everyone safe." Evelyn states, "During these times, I find myself being God's hands, feet, and voice, and a true vessel to pray with my patients and encourage them to fight the good fight of faith. I would often tell my patients that Jesus is alive and well. He has all power in His hands, to heal and deliver you." As a COVID 19 RN, Evelyn assumes the job and role of a coach. She is constantly coaching patients on how to breathe and relax. She hugs her patients, cries with them, reminds them of who they are fighting for, to stay alive, and she holds their hands, so they are aware that they are not alone. "At the end of the day, you might feel defeated, but you leave reassured that you did your very best and you have a purpose, so that you can return to work the very next day."

Evelyn's advice to people, during this season in our lives, is to continue to follow the CDC guidelines of social distancing 6 feet, especially in local stores, frequent hand washing, use hand sanitizer, avoid social gatherings, and most importantly, wear masks. Her warning to everyone is, "Do not take COVID 19 as a joke, the numbers may have decreased, but the illness is real."

Evelyn Pauling is a member of Mount Nebo UMC and a former president of the local church UMW. She is a Certified Lay Servant, Sunday school teacher, and Chairperson of Finance. She was the Vice President of the Orangeburg District UMW from 2004-2008, South Carolina Conference UMW Spiritual Growth Coordinator and Chairperson of the Spiritual Growth Retreat Committee, 2014-2017, and she is currently serving on the SCCUMW Committee on Nominations.

While fulfilling her purpose as a nurse, she has received many awards and accolades, and is certified in various areas. Evelyn Pauling is married to Malachia Pauling. 
