Social Action Coordinator Report

Washington Street UMC is the home of a workshop that provides young people of all ability's endless opportunities in the performing arts. This accessible arts program is led by professional artists and allows youth from 5 to 21 years old to present live performances.

Named in honor of her grandfather, Papa Tank for Inclusion was started in 2023 by Bryann Burgess, who has Down Syndrome, and cofounder, Larry Hembree, well-known in Midlands theater groups. Beginning with a grant from the Central Carolina Community Foundation, Papa Tank respects and embraces the uniqueness of all people to provide artistic opportunities for young people. It believes everyone has an artist inside them that wants to tell their own stories.

On June 8th and 9th at 3:00pm, the workshop students will present an original End-of-Season performance. "When the Trees Sing" will feature both performing and visual art works inspired by the poems of Mattie Stepanek. Before he died at the age of 13 of dysautonomic mitochondrial myopathy, Mattie had published 7 best-selling books of poetry and peace essays and was known as a peace advocate and motivational speaker. All the students will take part in the performances either on-stage or behind the scenes. Tickets are \$10.00 and may be purchased online at papatank.org.

Later in June, the South Carolina Conference United Women in Faith Charter for Racial Justice Committee will present its second annual Racial + Environmental Justice Event on June 22, 2024, at 10:00am. This virtual workshop will address the issue of protecting historically Black settlements from incompatible development, especially that of the Gullah Geechee community on St. Helena Island, SC.

The program is funded by a grant from the National United Women in Faith and will feature two guest speakers. Faith Rivers James is the Executive Director of the Coastal Conservation League. She will be discussing the devastating cultural and environmental impacts of proposed development. Amy Armstrong is the Executive Director and General Counsel for the South Carolina Environmental Law Project. This organization provides legal assistance to the Gullah Geechee Sea Island Coalition in their efforts to either keep this land or ensure its proper development. Beaufort County had already established this area as a Cultural Protective Overlay District, but the developer is working to end that distinction.

Registration information will be available in the Mission Echo newsletter. Also, a site visit to the historic Penn Center and the Gullah community on St. Helena Island is being planned for February of 2025. This trip will be very educational for both our youth and UWF sisters.



Killingsworth is a community residence that encompasses a safe space for women who have left or been removed from crisis situations. The residents have access to room and board, guidance, and support to regain confidence and stability. Killingsworth requires each resident to be involved in a productive activity resulting in most residents finding employment. This allows for women to be adequately prepare for graduating from the program and becoming self-sufficient when returning to the community. The mission of Killingsworth is to support, empower, and advocate for women recovering from various life crisis within a safe and nurturing Christian environment. To continue providing support to these women, it is important that we receive support from the United Methodist Church and all the community to remain being a blessing.


