SCCUWFaith

As the conference representative for Columbia Bethlehem Community Center (CBCC), I participated in a Zoom meeting with director, Kara Simmons re: up-coming activities at CBCC to get a feel for the operations of the organization. Summer plans include parterning with Francis Burns UMC to provide complementary breakfast and lunch meals for youth and seniors. The center will also partner with Black Girls Clubhouse, Inc. to focus on personal growth, mentoring, academic readiness, character development, social-emotional competencies and self-confidence.

On May 21st, I served as a volunteer to help bag fresh fruits and vegetables to be delivered to persons throughout the CBCC community and neighboring areas. A second food distribution was held Tuesday, June 18, 2024.

Local Unit UWFaith

Social Action Lexie Chatham

I've been extremely busy since we last met in March. An interfaith group of which I'm a member, the Jubilant Singers, performed in 9 nursing homes and 2 churches (one of which was Whaley St UMC) during April and May. Both the residents and our singers were blessed tremendously by this!

I'm also on the Methodist Student Network board at USC. Rev Tom Wall chose to leave his position there after serving for more than 30 years, and we were deep in the process of finding a new leader for that vastly important transitional place of worship and mission. A farewell reception was held for Tom on April 28th, and Rev Jad Tylor was chosen to start MSN's new leadership beginning July 1st.

As the Native American Council Coordinator for my church, I arranged for Tracy Pender, the SC UMC Native American Coordinator, to speak at Mt Hebron UMC on April 21st. Tracy told Native American spiritual tales and explained how they reflect parables in the Bible. We are planning to have a drum circle come this fall to present Native American spiritual songs and traditional hymns that have been adapted into their culture.

I've also helped fill in for our president at Mt Hebron's General Unit of Circles during Kathy Hornsby's illness and death. We've lost a lot of church and thus circle members since the failed UMC separation vote in January. We're still trying to get our footing back, but slowly are getting back to our dedication to missions. Last week Mary Nell Trussell and I delivered to Killingsworth a basket of paper goods and cleaning supplies that our church had collected. We had just returned from attending the SCCUMC Annual Conference, which felt like a revival blessing in our souls. While

there, I also attended the breakfast sponsored by the Reconciling Ministries Network to hear about the actions taken by the General Conference and challenges still faced by RMN.

On June 5th, I attended an advocacy program at Brookland UMC for caregivers of those with dementia. This disease is being addressed in various ways at other UMC churches as well. Washington St UMC has a brief half hour service for these individuals on the third Thursday of each month which I attend. Also, Mt Hebron UMC is holding a planning meeting this Thursday to discuss programs concerning dementia to be held there. All are welcome and I plan to attend.

Finally, I'm participating with the Racial Justice Action Team at Washington St UMC along with Debra Schooler and Carrie Murray. Last night we heard from representatives of the non-profit advocacy group, More Justice. Each year this multi-racial, interfaith organization addresses an issue challenging Midlands' residents by bringing together the parties involved to seek ways to alleviate or improve conditions. I've been asked to get more information about More Justice and present it to our Columbia District UMW for consideration about participation. This sounds like it will tie in and supplement this Saturday's Zoom meeting concerning protecting traditionally African America communities from developers.

Social Action Coordinator Report



Prayers are always encouraged to uplift the students during this transition in life. That takes not just spiritual but also physical food for nourishment. If there's one thing the students really appreciate, it's having a good home cooked meal served after Sunday night's worship service. Precious relationships can be formed with the students while praising God together. More Justice of Columbia is an interfaith based organization that started in 2017. Inspired by Micah 6:8, the ministry strives to "do justice, love mercy, and walk humbly with God." This organization is guided by the Prophet Nehemiah's emphasis on more than "mercy ministry" that addresses individual needs. They focus on "justice ministry" to advocate for social changes. For example, More Justice recently led a successful campaign to promote mental health education. Meetings with local law enforcement agencies led to increased Crisis Intervention Training for their officers. Other social issues examined included gun violence prevention, lack of fair housing, and the growing problem of food deserts. Churches are invited to participate in More Justice's activities by forming small groups to identify and prioritize the injustices that impact their communities. Research is gathered to suggest measurable action steps to present to community leaders for consideration of adoption. Additional information is available at morejusticecolumbia.org.








A KNOCK AT MIDNIGHT: A STORY OF HOPE, JUSTICE AND FREEDOM

BRITTANY K. BARNETT CROWN (2021)

Brittany K. Barnett was a law student when she came across the case that would change her life forever—that of Sharanda Jones, single mother, businessowner, and, like her, Black daughter of the rural South. A victim of America's war on drugs, Sharanda had been separated from her young daughter and was serving a life sentence without parole for a first-time drug offense. As Barnett studied this case, a system came into focus with widespread racial injustice at the core of America's addiction to incarceration. Moved, Barnett set to work to gain Sharanda's freedom. The memoir is at once Barnett's coming-of-age story and a powerful evocation of what it takes to bring hope and justice to a system built to resist them.

*BEFORE WE WERE YOURS (2022 Nurturing For Community)



"Before We Were Yours" by Lisa Wingate is a historical fiction novel that alternates between two timelines. The story is inspired by the real-life scandal involving the Tennessee Children's Home Society, where poor children were kidnapped and sold to wealthy families from the 1920s to 1950.

The novel follows the lives of the Foss siblings in 1939 Memphis, who are taken from their parents and placed in the orphanage. The main narrative is centered around Rill Foss, the eldest of the siblings, who tries to keep her family together despite the harsh conditions and abuse they endure. In the modern-day storyline, the novel follows Avery Stafford, a successful lawyer who stumbles upon a family secret that links her to the Foss children.

As Avery uncovers the truth, the novel explores themes of family, identity, loss, and the complexities of the adoption system. "Before We Were Yours" is a poignant tale that delves into the dark history of child trafficking in America while also highlighting the resilience and enduring bonds of family.

Kara Simmons, Executive Director, expresses her gratitude for the support and commitment she has received for Columbia Bethlehem Community Center. Because of SCCUWFaith and the surrounding community, the Center has successfully sponsored several programs / events.

During Spring Break, high school youths participated in an Acting/Filmmaking Masterclass where they produced an original film.

During the month of April, several children participated in a Sow and Grow activity. Each child decorated flower pots, filled them with small plants, and watched them grow. The children presented the potted plants to their moms on the Saturday before Mother's Day at the Mommies and Movies event.

In June, CBCC partnered with Richland School District One's Summer Café and Francis Burns UMC to sponsor a Summer Feeding Program. An average of 30 children received free breakfast and lunch daily.

The **Ready! Set! Read!** Literacy Initiative afforded students an opportunity to enhance reading and comprehension skills, and receive free books. An added bonus was the appearance of Dr. Aaron Bishop, Chair of the Richland School District 1 Board of School Commissioners, and his wife, who read aloud to the children and expressed the importance of reading to succeed.

Local South Carolina farmers in conjunction with the Columbia Housing Authority continue to donate fresh fruits and vegetables to CBCC. Board members and volunteers gather monthly to assemble eighty to one hundred bags that are distributed to residents near CBCC and to those throughout the Columbia Area.

The Center partnered with **Discover ME Academy 2024**: **Black Girls' Clubhouse**, **Inc**. The focus of this event was to provide a safe space for black girls to develop meaningful relationships; discover their talents; and experience healthy emotional and social aspects of child development. Attendance was very good.

Recently, I delivered items from the SCCUWFaith Mission u Craft Room to CBCC. The items were well received and will be available for give away at the August 10th Back to School Event and prizes at the BINGO event for kids.


